At the sweet age of 16, My Dad surprised me with a1968 Plymouth sports fury SS. It was a big maroon cruiser and drove like a dream! The reason for my own wheels was transportation to work where I was a waitress at the Lake Lodge & Diner. I was also allowed to drive to school (test run of trust) which was 9 glorious miles of freedom. Upon arrival I turned my beautiful maroon car over to my boyfriend for ½ of our lunchtime break and when I took over driving, trouble began. I was driving up the windy hill to the back parking lot and noticed other drivers were pulling over, but I didn't know why until I finally saw flashy lights behind me. Uh oh. I was glad I listened to my Dad when he handed me the keys; he said "now Babe, if you get pulled over be polite and have your license and reg. ready". He was a smart man, and it was nice of him to say, "If you get pulled over".

I got out my brand-new driver license and temporary registration & waited as a very large cop who sounded like Johny Cash asked me for my ID and why it took me so long to pull over. Hmm? He slowly drawled; "your first citation will be for speeding: 50 in a 20 zone and the second citation for eluding a police officer". Lucky for ME, I got out of the second charge when I showed him that my mirrors were adjusted for my tall boyfriend and not me. I am sure the cop hoped I would get some brains soon and I got another very useful lecture before he sent me on my way. I was not allowed to drive to school for quite a while and I had to earn the money to pay for the speeding ticket. I loved Big Red and drove it proudly until the summer of 1975 when I was broad sided by a truck and that was the end of her.

Staying with my grandparents the summer of '75, I talked my grandpa into letting me get a souped up 1965 Caspian Blue mustang. Now this car was way cooler than the sports fury. Grandpa encouraged me to sell it to the highest bidder before he went broke! Mustang sold and onto the Ford Pinto which spent more time in the repair shop than on the road. Broke down in Casper WY. which was not a good place to get parts. I had Tahiti Blue until 1986 when I reluctantly traded it in for a black Cadillac Allante.... And the list goes on & on. I've never lost my admiration or desire for beautiful vehicles so when I was invited to join the LCCC I figured what a great way to meet people and see if something fast and flashy might cross my path. "Old Blue"

This month's featured ride belongs to Mark & Sandie Eide of Warrenton, OR. It's a 1941 Chevrolet AK (1/2-ton short bed pickup). Mark found this truck in Phoenix, AZ in July of 2015 and brought it home where it began a 4 year rebuild. Mark was



drawn to the truck as his father's first purchase after returning home from the Korean war was a 1941 Chevrolet pickup. This one originally sported a 216 cubic inch 6-cylinder engine and a 4-speed transmission. Mark custom built a new chassis by

boxing in the frame, adding independent front suspension, rack & pinion steering and tubular Aarms. The new power is a 2003 5.3L Chevrolet Vortec engine from a Silverado pickup. It is mated to a 4L60 custom high performance-built transmission with custom computer programing. The rear end is a Ford 9" Posi track unit with 350:1 gear ra-

tio fitted to a 3-link suspension and coil over shocks and 4-wheel disc brakes. The interior is reupholstered 41 Chevy style seating with vintage air conditioning, cruise control and solid stereo. The headlights are quartz halogen type with the turn signals built in. There are stainless steel strips fitted to the running boards. Mark did all of the work and fabrication himself except the paint. The truck was completed in August of 2018 and won the Commander's Choice trophy at the 2022 50's Cruise hosted by the Lower Columbia Classics at Camp Rilea . Mark's other automotive interest include a 69 Corvette, a 2014 Corvette, a 70 Challenger and a 67 Chevy II Nova.

Ruth Dale

October 16, 1928 - February 22, 2025

Ruth Elsie (Anderson) Dale, age 96, died February 22, 2025 in Beaverton, Oregon. She was born October 16, 1928, in Astoria, Oregon, to Elise and Erik Anderson, joining two older brothers, Eric and Lloyd.



Ruth attended Clatsop Plains School, a two-room schoolhouse on (now) Dellmoor Loop, through

grade 8. She graduated from Seaside Union High School and then took business courses at Northwestern Business College in Portland and Pacific University in Forest Grove. In 1947-48, Ruth was employed as a bank clerk in Seaside, and then in 1948-49, as an Accounts Receivable Clerk in Richland, Washington. It was during her time in Richland that she met Jackson (Jack) M. Dale, her future husband. Ruth and Jack married on May 27, 1950, in Lewiston, Idaho. After their marriage, Ruth worked at U.S. Naval Station Tongue Point for about five years. She then took a pause to focus on family.

Ruth and Jack shared a long and happy married life, raising two daughters on property adjacent to the home in which Ruth grew up. Off and on throughout much of her life, she and Jack participated in the family-operated farm that raised cranberries and sold the berries to Ocean Spray Cooperative. In addition to being a busy wife and mother, she was a loving and dedicated daughter, assisting her parents who lived in her birth home until their deaths in 1970 and 1972.

Ruth enjoyed gardening, picking wild and cultivated berries, and digging razor clams on the beach. While her own children were young, Ruth volunteered her time as scout leader, Sunday school teacher, and election board worker. Ruth returned to paid work for a few seasons in the fish canneries in Astoria during the 1960s. Later, she and Jack volunteered together with American Cancer Society's Relay for Life and the Astoria Senior Center, among other organizations.

Ruth loved being a grandmother and great-grandmother. When her grandchildren were young, she and Jack often welcomed them to visit and make grandparent/grandkid memories 'at the beach'. She liked to stay active, but housework was not a favorite activity. In evidence of her dry wit, she unapologetically displayed a sign that said, "Housework never killed anyone, but why take a chance?"

Watching hummingbirds, cloud formations, ocean waves, and sunsets brought pleasure to Ruth's life after the fun of gardening and clam digging wore off and those activities, too, began to feel like work. Ruth has enjoyed the friendships of many special people, some who she has known since high school and just beyond. She also valued her affiliation over many vears with Lutheran congregations in Seaside, Chinook, Washington, and Astoria.

Ruth was preceded in death by her brothers Eric and Lloyd Anderson and her husband Jack Dale. Ruth is survived by daughters and sons-in-law Kathryn and George Best of Beaverton and Diane and Andy DeMott of Spokane, Washington; four grandchildren Elisa Buckley, Sarah Kinnie, Jennifer Forland, and Jeff DeMott; one nephew Loren Wolsiffer; four greatgrandchildren; and one great-great grandson.

A gathering and celebration of life will be scheduled for later in the year.
